We continue to be amazed at what the Internet brings into our lives, and one of the interests it has affected the most is genealogy.

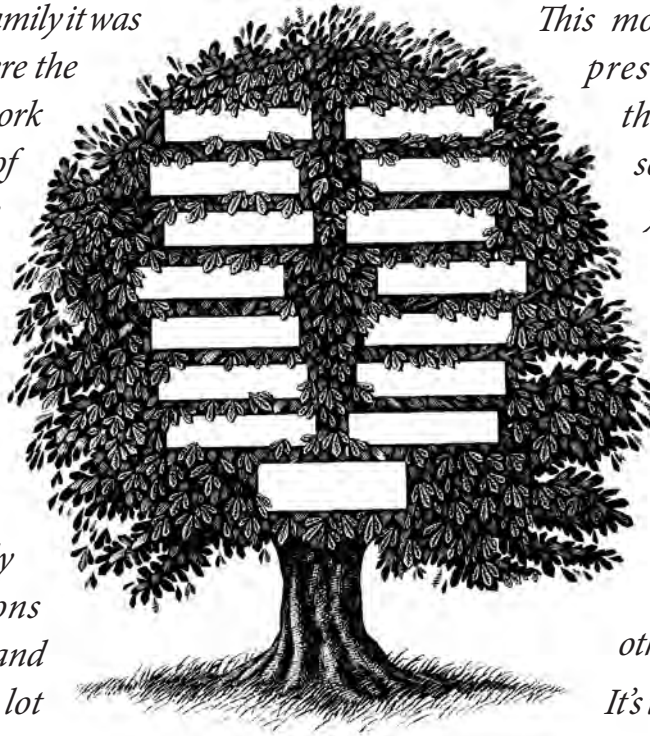

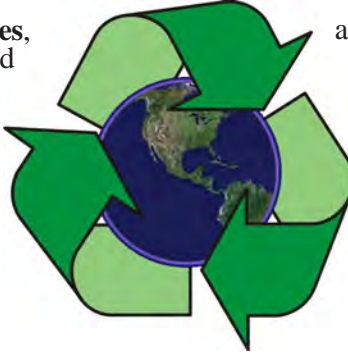

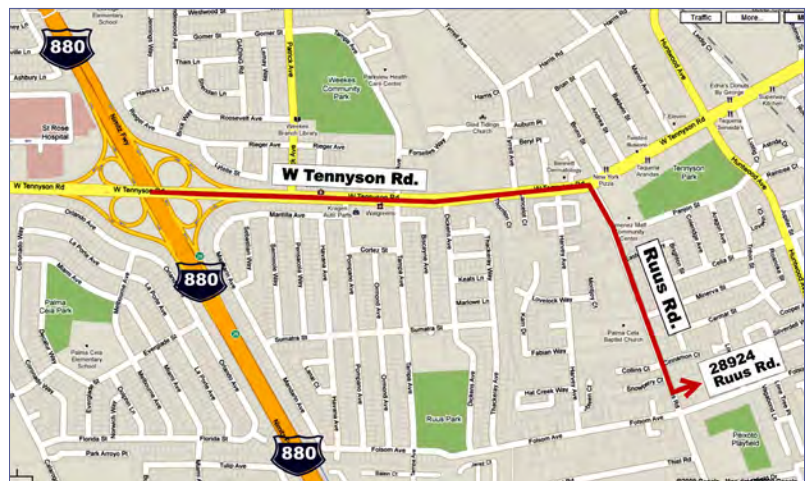
Directions to the PCC Main Meeting

Short & Simple Tips To Make Things Easier

Email Tip

I often receive email messages that I would like to send to other people. However, I find I'm annoyed with messages that have been forwarded several times, because they have long vertical lines in the text that cause the content to be indented. To remove the extraneous material, I usually attempt to copy the text and paste it into a new message. But I've run into problems when doing so in Microsoft Outlook. The solution I found was that I need to click Reply (to the sender), so that I can copy the photo or image and paste the items into a new message. After that I delete the original message, so that I can send a "clean" copy to my intended recipients.

Internet Explorer 9 Security

The newest version of Internet Explorer includes features that are designed to better protect you from malware attacks. Reader Vic Kivat described several of IE9's new security features. First off, the Application Reputation system, which provides pop-up information about file downloads, helps to provide a warning when dealing downloadable content. Microsoft's reputation database will show you red warnings if the download is known to offer malicious content. Another helpful feature is Tracking Protection, which is designed to block the third-party tracking of your PC from Web sites. Signing Off

Cancel Your Online Accounts

Every popular online service serves a purpose, and they've all had their day in the sun. Nothing lasts forever, though, and time (not to mention technology) marches on. If you're like most Internet users, the next great thing will sometimes replace what you did before. Alternatively, you may find that your participation in an online community doesn't bring you any value and may even involve negative risks. In short, there eventually comes a time to delete your account. Online services don't always make this process easy. But we'll provide click-by-click instructions for permanently signing off from 11 online services—if you're ready to pull the plug.

Facebook. Facebook offers two options: deactivate or permanently delete. Deactivations can be considered a "light delete"; your account disappears from view but can be reactivated at any time by simply logging back in and opting to do so. To deactivate your account, log in at www.facebook.com and access the Account option from the menu at the top of the page. Choose Account Settings and click the Security link in the left menu. Facebook will display a grid full of information with a link at the bottom to Deactivate Your Account. Choose that link, indicate a reason (you'll need to add Comments if you choose Other), and click Confirm. You'll need to enter your password, click Confirm again, then re-enter an on-screen confirmation code

and click Submit. The full delete option is a little more hidden. Go to the Facebook Help Center, also accessible from the Account menu option. Enter "delete account" in the Search box and select the option that appears asking how to permanently delete. Follow the link presented, click Submit, enter your password and on-screen confirmation code, and click Okay. Note that the deletion isn't actually permanent for 14 days, though your account is immediately deactivated for the interim. During that time, you can log in and cancel the deletion if you change your mind.

Twitter. Twitter also describes its account removal as a "deactivation," though all data is permanently deleted 30 days after deactivation. Logging in at

www.twitter.com during that time will reactivate the account. From the menu tied to your account name at the top right, click Settings. At the very bottom of the default Account tab, select Deactivate My Account. Review Twitter's advice and, if you want, click the Tell Us link to contact support first. If you're ready to complete the deactivation, click the button labeled Okay, Fine, Deactivate. Re-enter your password and click Deactivate Account.

Google+. Google+ is the new social networking site from the online giant. At press time, it's still an invitation-only service and has been closed to new memberships. If you received an early invite but want to delete your account, follow these steps. Log in to your Google+

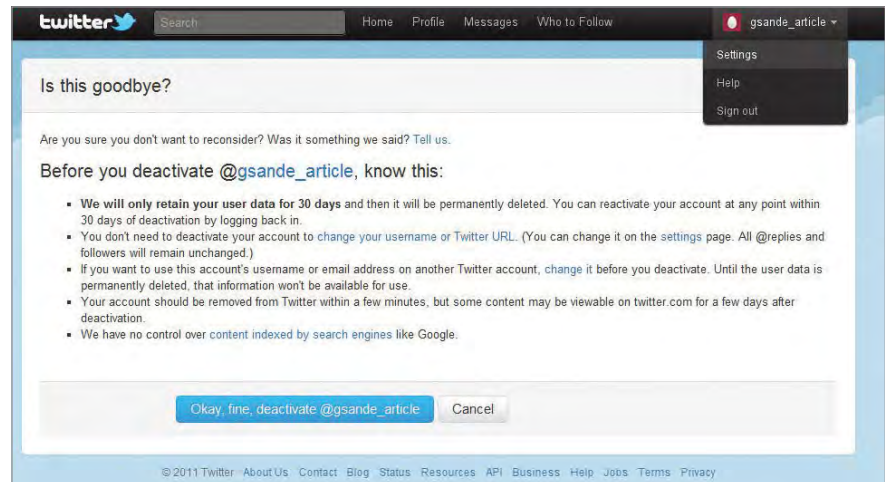

As with many services, Facebook prompts you to provide a reason for leaving.

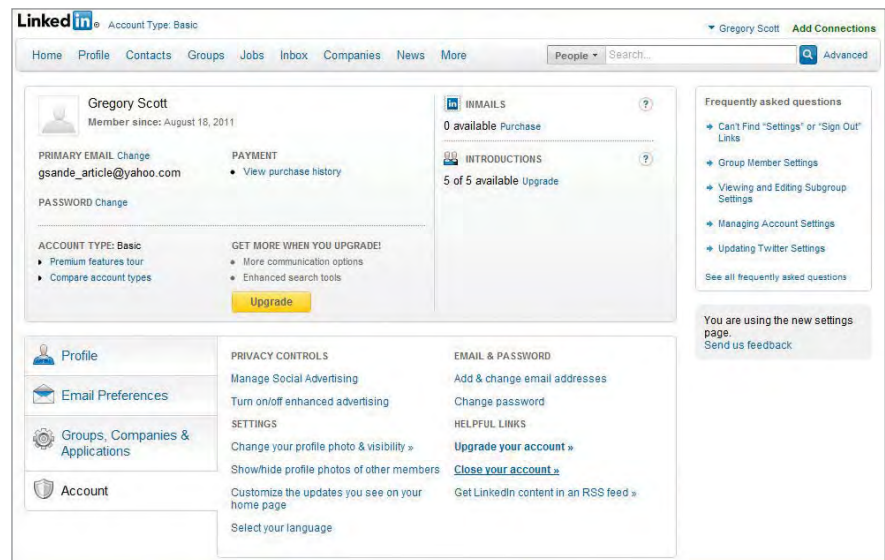
account (plus.google.com), click your name from the top-right menu, and select Account Settings. In the Account Overview menu, find the Services section and click the link to Delete Profile And Remove Associated Social Features. You'll be presented with two options: Delete Google+ Content and Delete Your Entire Google Profile. Unless you want to permanently remove your entire Google profile and all associated services, select the radio button for Delete Google+ Content. Review the information Google presents about what items will and won't be removed, along with timelines, and then check the box labeled Required to indicate you understand what you're doing. Click the Remove Selected Services button. Note that Picasa photos, Gmail and Talk contacts, and connections to third-party services will be unaffected. For now, Google+ deletion is permanent, and you won't be able to create another account until the trial period is over and the service is opened to the public.

LinkedIn. Log in at www.linkedin.com, open the menu associated with your name at the top right of the home screen, and select Settings. Click the Account category title at the bottom left of the screen and choose Close Your Account from the list of options. Select one of LinkedIn's radio button reasons or choose Other and type your own. Click Continue and then review your account information and select Verify Account. Review LinkedIn's warnings and caveats about deletion and timelines, and then click Close Account.

Hotmail. Free Hotmail accounts now become automatically inactive, with all content deleted after 270 days without logging in. However, if you want to take matters into your own hands immediately, simply log in to your Hotmail account at www.hotmail.com. Open the menu associated with your name at the top right of the screen and click Account. Under the Other Options header, select the Close Your Account link. Enter your password to verify identity and click Yes. This will attempt to close your entire Windows Live account, but won't

let you as long as the Hotmail account is still open. The error message which appears on-screen will provide a link to Close Your Microsoft Account, which actually closes your Hotmail account. Click the link and select the Close Account button on the resulting screen.

Yahoo! Mail. Yahoo! maintains an Account Termination Page, but you have to work through the Help resources to access it. From your Yahoo! Mail account (mail.yahoo.com), open the Help menu in the top left of the screen and click Help. Enter "terminate account"

in the Search text box and click Search Help. Select the results asking How Do I Close My Yahoo! Account? From the help article, click the link to the Account Termination page. You'll need to log in again to access the Termination Page and then again at the bottom of the page. Enter the on-screen confirmation code and click Terminate This Account. Note that any information in related Yahoo! services (including Flickr) will also be deleted.

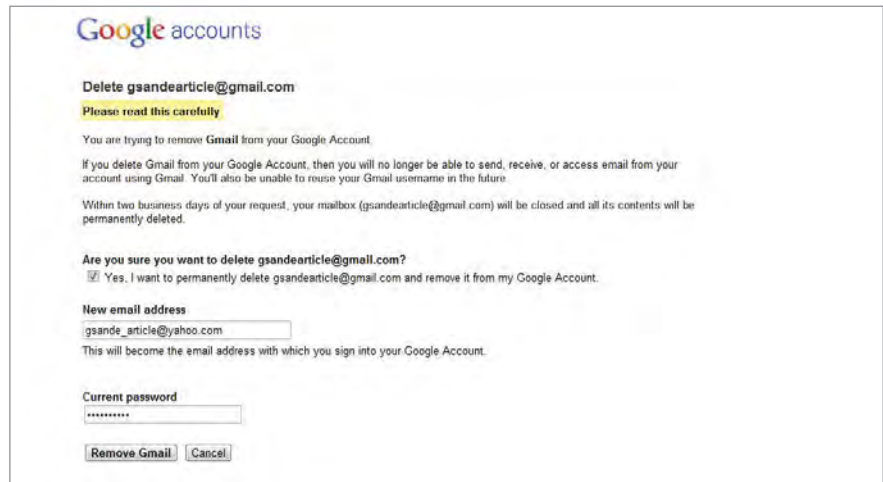
Gmail. As with Google+ and other Google services, you can delete your

Gmail account without your overall Google profile and other Google services. First, log in at www.gmail.com. Click the gear icon in the top-right corner of the browser and select Mail Settings. Open the Accounts And Import tab and, in the Change Account Settings section, click the Other Google Account Settings link. On the resulting Google Accounts screen, choose the Edit link next to the My Products header. Click the link for Remove Gmail Permanently in the Delete A Product section. Read the warning—deletion is permanent and the username won't be available again. Then click Yes to the "Are You Sure" question and provide another email address with your current password. This will become your new logon to access other Google services. Click Remove Gmail.

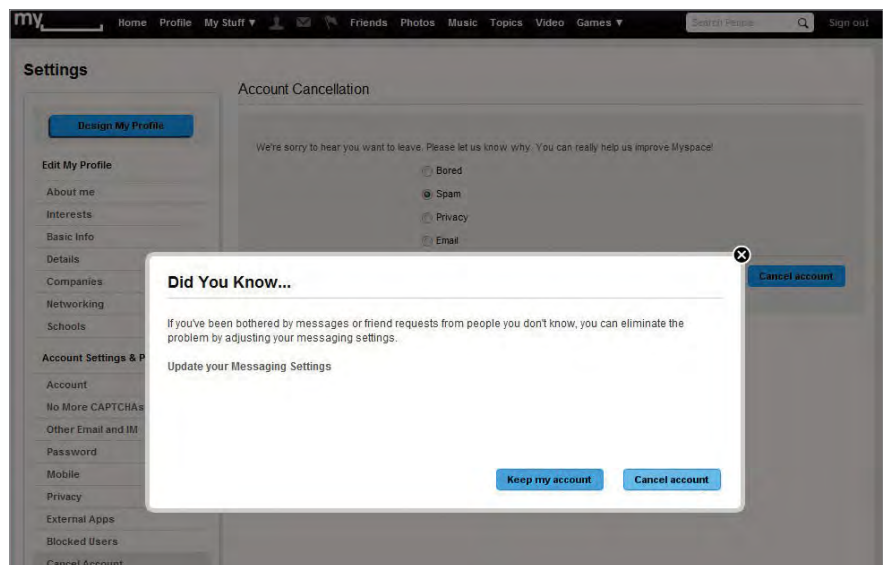
Meetup. Meetup, one of the first social networking services, has one of the easiest processes to sign off. Log in at www.meetup.com, click the Account link at the top of the screen, and select the Membership & Communication menu option. At the bottom of the screen click the Unsubscribe button, re-enter your password, and click Submit.

YouTube. Load the YouTube home page by entering www.youtube.com or clicking the link from Google's home page (under the More menu). Log in and click the expandable menu at the top of the page near your username. From the resulting My Account menu, click Settings. From the menu that loads on the left, click Manage Account. Under the Close Account section, between Change Password and Change Which Google Account Is Linked To This Account, click the Close Account button. Provide a reason and click Close Account again. Note that canceling your YouTube account will also delete any of your uploaded videos.

Yelp. Unlike most other online services, Yelp's online account deletion runs through its Contact Us function. Log in to your account at www.yelp.com and, under the Help menu at the bottom of the page, click the Contact Yelp link. Choose Help Me Use Yelp in the first drop-down menu and choose Close My Account as the subtopic. Enter any

comments you care to provide and click Send. You'll receive a confirmation email with a link, which you'll have to click to complete the deletion.

Myspace. Log into your Myspace account at www.myspace.com and select Account Settings from the My Stuff menu at the top of the screen. In the Account Settings And Privacy section of the menu to the left of the Account screen, click the Cancel Account link. In the Account Cancellation screen, click the Cancel Account button, select a reason from the

available options (including Bored, Spam, Privacy, and Email), view the advice on how to avoid your concern, and click Cancel Account. Click Cancel Account again, enter Cancellation Comments, and click Cancel Account one more time. Believe it or not, cancellation still isn't complete without email verification. Check your inbox and click the link in the confirmation email from Myspace. This link takes you to another page where you need to log in, confirm your email address, and click Cancel Account one last time. ■

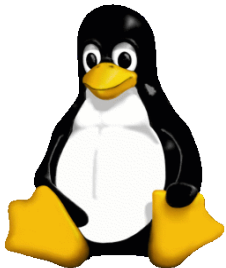

The Penguin Partition Linux for Human Beings

Mixed bag this month. The new Ubuntu 11.10 is here and I've managed to stuff it into three of my computers. Two were fresh installs and one was an online upgrade, just to see how it works.

Ubuntu continues development of their Unity interface, which is a departure from both the old and the new GNOME interface. Personally, I like the new GNOME interface better than Ubuntu's Unity, so I am disappointed that it was not an alternative installation option to Ubuntu's Unity.

Some of the pain is assuaged, though, as Unity is improved on several usability items over the previous version. It remains icon-driven, but has improved in both configuration options and performance.

Starting at the beginning, it uses many of the aspects of Ubuntu's Netbook Remix for its interface. It remains short of the gold standard for icon-driven interfaces, namely the Macintosh OS X Dock, but it has acquired many of the Macintosh features. My impression is that GNOME has always experienced Mac envy, but Unity is an individual expression of it.

Unity has become a lot more like GNOME 3 in function, if not in appearance. Both of them fall short of Macintosh OS X in both usability and the coolness factor, but they

are both going in the direction that computer interfaces are going, spearheaded by iPad and Android on tablet computers. With the advent of multi-point touch screens, computer interfaces are moving away from the traditional mouse and are becoming finger-friendly.

Even Microsoft is not immune from this development, as the main feature of the upcoming Windows 8 is a touch-screen icon-driven interface (Microsoft calls them "tiles") that is intended to be installable on everything from Smartphones to servers. To be sure, the "old" menu-driven interface will be available, but Windows 8 is intended to keep Windows relevant in a touch-screen world.

Microsoft has its work cut out for it, as Windows 7 on touch-screen tablets is an irritating example of how poorly menu-driven interfaces adapt to touch screens. Ubuntu and GNOME are facing the same challenges right now, but Ubuntu (for one) has a head start

with Unity and its Netbook Remix. Android (remember, it's Linux) is a good example of how it can be done. The divide right now is that none of the successful tablet computers use an Intel CPU, so it will be interesting to see how the dominant OSs on the Intel platform adapt.

These are the times when the phrase, "may you live in interesting times" is not necessarily a curse. . .


